The public meeting will continue on Wednesday, April 10, 2024. Additional time is reserved for public comment at 10:30 a.m. Wednesday, April 10, 2024. A copy of the budget document may be inspected or obtained on or after April 5, 2024 at the Board of Commissioners' Office, Polk County Courthouse, during regular business hours. This is a public meeting where deliberation of the Budget Committee will take place. Any person may appear at the meeting and discuss the proposed budget with the Budget Committee. SEDCOR will host a first-time event Nov. 9 to connect Willamette Valley farmers with local food processors.

Farmers can drop in anytime between 9 a.m. and 1 p.m. at the Chemeketa Community College Agriculture Complex, 4000 Lancaster Drive NE in Salem, to meet in-nerson with representatives from several food processing companies.

The event is free to attend.

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SALEM — A Salem-based nonprofit is working to connect Willamette Valley farmers with area food processors to strengthen the region's agricultural supply chains.

The Strategic Economic Development Corp., better known as SEDCOR, will host a first-time event where producers can meet face-to-face with representatives from food processing companies and potentially contract their acres for the upcoming growing season.

Public Members are an Important Part of the **Oregon Beef Council**

Oregon agricultural commodity beef to grass seed, to potatoes. The Public Member position was added to each group by the Oregon Legislature and many farmers and ranchers were not sure what this would mean to their group However in my experience the Public Member board members we have had on the Oregon Beef Council have been excellent strategic partners For example, we had a French-born award-winning chef on our board. Do you think that did us some good for beef? It did.

This short article is a brief interview with our current public member. Speaking of strategic partners, Alex Paraskevas works for the Strategic Economic Development Corp

and he is our Oregon Beef Council Public Member on our board. He was appointed by the Director of the Oregon Department of Agriculture and wanted his organization to take a deep dive into agriculture. Alex has become not only a strategic ally, but a friend of our farmers and ranchers.

Will: Tell us a little about yourself and what it has been like as the Public Member of the Oregon Beef Council.

Alex: I work for SEDCOR, a regional economic development organization operating in Marion, Polk, and Yamhill counties. We focus on supporting traded sector businesses - businesses that are growing, manufacturing, or processing goods that are then exported out of the region. SEDCOR strives to make sure that they are happy, healthy, and growing. We operate through the lens that healthy communities are built on healthy businesses that employ people in healthy jobs. In the past five years, we have focused on supporting the "farm-to-table" supply chain, understanding its challenges and opportunities, and helping businesses by providing tools and fostering

My favorite way to learn about how things work is to jump in and get involved, and joining the Oregon Beef Council was for that very reason - to gain a better understanding of commodity commissions and build relationships in the agricultural industry. It's been incredible, I've learned a lot about market forces, supply

Alex: At SEDCOR we had been batting round the idea of a networking event etween food processors and buyer amasa Inc., one of the world's largest manufacturers of soy sauce with US adquarters based in Salem, was looking for locally grown hard red them to Bruce and Helle Ruddenklau of Ruddenklau Farms outside of Amity,

who is now their red wheat supplier. As a participant in the Resource Education and Agricultural Leadership (REAL) Oregon program, I had the opportunity to meet Matthew Cook, head of the Oregon Processed Vegetable Commission (OPVC) whose administrator is Randi Alexander-Rolison whom I knew from the Oregon Beef Council. I attended one of the OPVC meetings where we brainstormed on organizing a networking event similar to what SEDCOR was already working on. This gave birth to the Locally Grown Supply Chain event. We invited larger food processors to have a table where farmers could drop in to make new connections. We had seven food processors and buyers in attendance including Yamasa Inc. Bob's Red Mill, Diana Foods, Kerr by Ingredion, Oregon Fruit Products, and National Frozen Foods/NORPAC. Everyone seemed happy with the outcome, and we are looking forward to hosting the event again next year!

Will: We appreciate your volunteer service as the Public Member on the Board of Directors of the Oregon Beef Council. Has getting to know Oregon ranchers and farmer on the Oregon Beef Council helped you with your goals an helped SEDCOR in the agricultural space?

Alex: Absolutely! Getting a better understanding of the concerns and thinking from the farm and ranch level has been invaluable. Most strategic economic development organizations don't operate in the agricultural space
