TOPIC	DISCUSSION	ACTION
Welcome, Introductions, Minutes	Introductions were made. The April and May minutes will be available for approval at the June meeting.	
Committee Membership	There was discussion surrounding committee membership. Jay Carey announced his resignation from the committee due to his pending retirement stating this would be the last meeting he would attend. Julio Vidrio resigned via email on May 6, 2014. When discussing <i>Standing Committee Members</i> it was determined Sara Dotson would be the designee from Polk County Behavioral Health and Matthew Stevenson would be the designee from SIT. The System Integration team recently changed their name to <i>Family & Community Outreach</i> . Stacey Daeshner will continue to represent DHS and if unable to attend will send a designee in her place. Marty Silbernagel will contact Public Health to discuss a representative from their department to act as a Standing Member. In reviewing the five members at large both Sally Penna and Julio Vidrio resigned recently leaving two vacancies. Remaining members include Chief Darrell Tallan, Jennifer Lief and Chief Simpson was nominated to be formally appointment by the Board of Commissioners. This leaves two vacant positions. Commissioner Ainsworth will reach out to Jason Clark at Central High School to find out if there was interest in an administrator from Central participating in the LAPPC. Jay Carey will speak with some individuals at WOU to determine if they would be interested in sitting on the committee and Marty Silbernagel will speak with a community member who might be interested.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Discussion
Mental Health Court	Marty Silbernagel brought up the idea of a Mental Health Court to Judge Campbell. Judge Campbell stated he would speak with the other judges about the topic as well as discuss the topic with Judge Graves, the Marion County Mental Health Court Judge. Judge Campbell was not sure if a Mental Health Court would be viable. Marty felt that there were probably 40-50 individuals in his agency who would benefit from this type of court. Marty pointed out all neighboring counties have Mental Health Courts, and now some are adding specialty courts for Veterans. Chief Tallan is in favor of a Mental Health court and feels as though it would benefit many individuals but not necessarily everyone. Marty suggested the committee come to an agreement about how to push forward with this idea. 	<p>similar to Sanction Court. Marty stated he would dedicate PO time. Stacey Daeshner stated “court acts as glue to coordinate services”. She stated some individuals need the support of “Navigators” similar to the Health Navigators to help people navigate through the systems. Chief Tallan suggested some of the Jail Diversion grant money could be used to fund a support place (designate a specific day and time) that individuals with MH issues could access that would not be considered “treatment”, but rather encouragement and ongoing support. Chief Tallan stated once people form a relationship they tend to utilize the resources offered and he could have officers start trying to help out and gather resources. Sara Dotson likes the idea will speak further to her supervisor to find out what kind of resources could be provided.</p>	
Committee Updates	<p>Jennifer Lief stated PC Addiction Services and Prevention were coordinating to work on a Bar-b- Que event for Recovery Month in September. There would be one event in Dallas and another event at the West Salem location. Details to be determined. Chief Tallan stated Monmouth successfully prevented a Hookah bar from coming into Monmouth when city planner educated the potential business owner as to the requirements and expenses to implement those requirements. Matthew stated during 2013 in Oregon hookah/e-cigarette/cigarillo/chew use among 11th graders (20.2%) was more than double cigarette use (9.8%). No single source was higher than cigarettes, but both hookah and e-cigarettes each have the potential for passing cigarettes in the coming couple of years. Polk County likely has a higher use of chew than of hookah, for example. But the problem is the rapid expansion of the use of e-cigarettes and hookah lounges. . Marty pointed out that the Medical Marijuana dispensary in Independence appeared to be open.</p>
